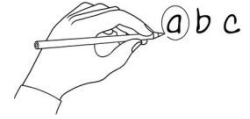




Adverbs - ANSWERS

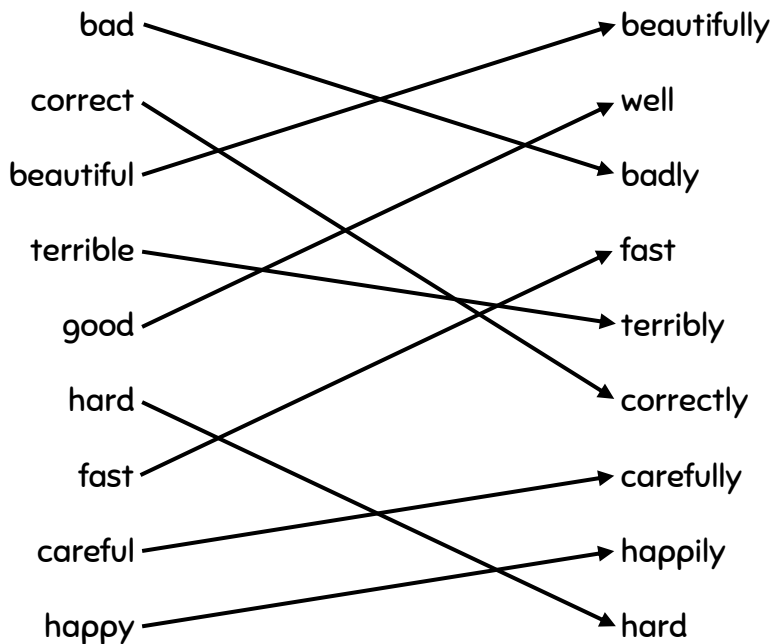


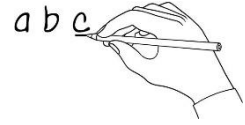

Match the adjectives and the adverbs.

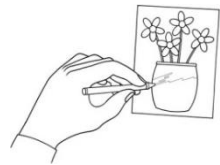




3. Make it right!
